

A Tragedy or a Blessing!

Years ago in Scotland, the Clark family had a dream. Clark and his wife worked and saved, making plans for their nine children and themselves to travel to the United States. It had taken years, but they had finally saved enough money and had gotten passports and reservations for the whole family on a new liner to the United States.

The entire family was filled with anticipation and excitement about their new life. However, seven days before their departure, a dog bit the youngest son. The doctor sewed up the boy but hung a yellow sheet on the Clark's front door. Because of the possibility of rabies, they were being quarantines for fourteen days.

The family's dreams were dashed. They would not be able to make the trip to America as they had planned. The father, filled with disappointment and anger, stomped to the dock to watch the ship leave - without the Clark family. The father shed tears of disappointment and cursed both his sons and God for their misfortune.

Five days later, the tragic news spread through Scotland - the mighty Titanic had sunk. The unsinkable ship had sunk, taking hundreds of lives with it. The Clark family was to have been on that ship, but because a dog had bitten the son, they were left behind in Scotland.

When Mr Clark heard the news, he hugged his son and thanked him for saving the family. He thanked God for saving their lives and turning what he had felt was a tragedy into a blessing!

Who was Fr Therry?

Fr John Joseph Therry was born in County Cork, Ireland in 1790, the son of John Therry and Eliza Connolly. He was ordained a priest in 1815 and was assigned to parochial work in Dublin and then Cork, where he became secretary to the bishop.

Fr Therry's interest in Australia, aroused by the transportation of Irish convicts and the publicity surrounding the forced return in 1818 of Fr Flynn, came to the notice of the authorities when they were looking to send two Roman Catholic chaplains to New South Wales. Fr Therry, recommended by his bishop, Dr Murphy, 'as a capable, zealous and valuable young man', sailed from Cork under senior priest Fr Philip Connolly on board the ship 'Janus', which also carried more than one hundred prisoners. They arrived in Sydney in May 1820, authorized by both church and state.

Fr Therry described his life in Australia for the next forty-four years as 'one of incessant labour very often accompanied by painful anxiety'. Popular, energetic and restless, he appreciated from the beginning the delicacy of his role. He had to be at once a farseeing pastor making up for years of neglect, a conscientious official of an autocratic British colonial system, and a pragmatic Irish supporter of the democratic freedoms. Though respectful of authority and grateful for co-operation, he was impatient of any curtailment of what he considered his own legal or social rights as a Catholic priest in



a situation governed by extraordinary circumstances. [Australian Dictionary of Biography Vol. 2 (MUP) 1967]

Although Fr Therry was mindful of the authority of the British colonial system, he worked tirelessly to improve the conditions of his flock and the disadvantaged. This of course often met with opposition and on one such occasion it led to his official status being withdrawn.

The British government decided on a major religious adjustment to ensure the stability, and increase the influence, of the state Church and Fr Therry had to fight for permission to carry out the vital services of his ministry. With the creation of the Church and School Corporation in 1825, the Church of England, under the leadership of Archdeacon Thomas Scott, was overwhelmingly favoured and although Fr Therry had established friendships and contacts with non-Catholics, he now became prominent in a possible opposition party. In an article printed in the Sydney Gazette on 14 June 1825, Fr Therry was misquoted in reference to 'the other Revd Gentlemen of the Establishment' which eventually resulted in Governor Darling removing his official status as Catholic Chaplain and withdrawing his salary. He was offered 300 pounds to leave the colony but refused to go and continued what he knew was his God-given work.

From that time until his reinstatement in 1837 Fr Therry continued his work as before but was forced to be more cautious and sometimes even secretive, as there were many who, because of their animosity, did everything they could to hinder him. He did not always advertise his movements. He carried on ministering to his people and deprived of his pension of 150 pounds per year relied upon their support for day to day living. He travelled whenever he was summoned, to Wollongong, Goulburn, Maitland, Bathurst and Newcastle.

The following extract from Dean Kenny's "Progress of Catholicity in Australia" gives us an insight into the character of Fr Therry.

'....the Rev. Father was prohibited from visiting the sick in the hospitals and infirmaries – when he could not administer to them the consolations of our Holy Religion. To show the fortitude and address of this apostolic man, whilst under ban, he went to visit a dying man at one of the hospitals. He was stopped by the guard when about to enter. Father Therry said to him, "the salvation of his man depends on my ministration; which is your first duty?" The guard, recognizing the right of the man of God, lowered his arms and permitted him to pass. At another time he was going into the infirmary to attend a sick person, when the doorkeeper told him to stop until he ascertained from the attendant surgeon whether he could be admitted. Whilst he was away, Father Therry, who knew all the passages of the place, entered, gave the sick person consolation, and when returning met the official, who told him he could not be admitted. Many of the petty officials were very insolent to Father Therry and his flock, taking advantage of the circumstances. It was permitted to have divine service in the old Court House, a large building, now a public school in Castlereagh Street, but because their pastor was not recognised by the Government, the door was locked against them. But in defiance of such insolence the door was forced open. It is said Mr Wentworth, the lawyer, was consulted as to the steps the Catholic ought to take to secure the

Court House for divine service, as they had as good a right as others to use it for that purpose. "What will you do?" said Wentworth. "Why, take a crowbar and break the door open; and if they take you to court, send for me, and I'll defend you".'

In 1932 Dan Ryan, a highly respected and reliable Maitland resident who did much research into the early history of Catholicity in the Hunter Valley, wrote "Father Therry must have been a frequent visitor to Maitland, as he was held in reverence by the old settlers, and his memory was a treasured one with their children."

Early documentary evidence of Fr Therry's presence in the Maitland area is from a letter which appeared in The Australian on November 2, 1827. The letter was dated October 29, 1827 and the writer was from Newcastle.

'The Reverend J. J. Therry has been here during the last fortnight. He has twice celebrated Mass at Newcastle (on Sunday and Sunday week) and has made in the interval a tour into the interior. His arrival has been hailed by all good Catholics with enthusiasm. The Venerable Archdeacon (C. of E.) has also made his appearance amongst us. He came here on Saturday last overland from Port Stephens, and set out today for Wallis Plains. He proposes, I believe, returning to Sydney by land conveyance.'

As reported previously, this was not Fr Therry's first visit to Newcastle and the interior.





Safety and Wellness in our Region - Candle Fires

In Catholic churches, schools and other organisations candles are most commonly lit as a physical reminder of symbolisms found in scripture. A candle is also an open flame capable of igniting anything that can burn and one of the most common and preventable causes of fire in Church properties.

The effects of fire are devastating. Physical injury, damage to property and the loss of assets might be the consequences that first spring to mind, however the interruption to business and mission, the loss of sensitive information and the emotional impact on workers and the community can also be significant.

Using candles safely

- Keep candles well away from items that can catch fire. This includes clothing, books, paper, curtains, Christmas trees, flammable decorations or liquids
- Think carefully about where you position candles:
 - Avoid using them in high traffic areas, especially around children who may knock them over
 - Make sure they are placed on stable, heat resistant surfaces
 - Keep them away from drafts, vents and ceiling fans to prevent rapid uneven burning, avoid flame flare ups and reduce the risk of items blowing into the flame and igniting
 - Place burning candles a safe distance apart so they are less likely to create drafts which can cause candles to flare
- Use sturdy candleholders made of non-combustible materials
- Never leave a burning candle unattended. All candles should be completely extinguished before you leave a room
- Extinguish candles with a candle snuffer and ensure that the wick is no longer glowing before leaving the candle
- Never allow children to use candles without adult supervision
- Do not burn candles all the way down
- Extinguish a candle if it flickers repeatedly, smokes or the flame becomes too high. Let it cool, trim the wick, check for drafts and then re-light
- Keep matches and lighters in a locked cupboard
- Consider using electric candles as an alternative to traditional candles.

When might this hazard apply?

Church properties are often unoccupied for long periods of time. A candle that is not extinguished properly can smoulder for many hours before reigniting and may go unnoticed until the fire is well established. Follow the safety tips above and ensure all candles are completely extinguished before leaving the premises.

Creating beautiful displays in schools and churches for Easter and other occasions is a special part of the celebration. Unfortunately fabric, paper and other highly flammable materials are often used with candles to create these displays. Consider carefully how and where you use candles and follow the safety tips above.

Saints and Feasts in July 2019



3RD JULY ST THOMAS THE APOSTLE was one of the twelve disciples commissioned by Jesus. In John's Gospel when upon hearing that Jesus had risen from the dead, Thomas replied, "Except I shall see in his hands the print of the nails, and put my finger into the print of the nails, and thrust my hand into his side, I will not believe". But when Jesus appeared Thomas then professed his faith - this story giving rise to the name "doubting Thomas". After Jesus' death it is widely

believed he sailed to India in 52AD where he established several churches in the southern state of Kerala. Tradition suggests he was martyred in 72AD; speared to death at a site now called St Thomas Mount, before being buried in Mylapore in modern day Chennai. St Thomas is one of the patron saints of India.



4TH JULY. ST EUZABETH OF PORTUGAL Elizabeth 1271-1336, St. Elizabeth of Portugal was the daughter of Peter III of Aragon and was named after her great-aunt, St. Elizabeth of Hungary, whose virtues she also inherited. In her married life with King Denis of Portugal she had to undergo a series of heavy trials which she endured with heroism. On more than one occasion she went

to considerable pains to bring about peace between her children and their father. After her husband's death she became a Franciscan Tertiary and showed unfailing charity towards the poor. She died in 1336; her body has remained incorrupt. Before the reform of the General Roman Calendar St. Elizabeth's feast was celebrated on July 8.



5TH JULY ST BARNABUS Born in 1502 in Cremona, Italy, Anthony became a medical doctor. In 1528 he was ordained a priest and cofounded the Barnabites, the religious congregation so called because it was headquartered in St. Barnabas Monastery in Milan. The Barnabites occupied the monastery in 1538, having been approved in 1533. Anthony popularized the forty-hour prayer ceremony, promoted the use of alter sacraments, and

introduced the ringing of church bells on Friday. He is depicted in liturgical art in habit. He died in 1539.



6TH JULY ST MARIA GORETTI was born in Ancona, Italy. She grew up on a farm with her mother and father and five brothers and sisters. In 1902 when she was only twelve years old, she was attacked by a nineteen year old farm hand. She survived in hospital for two days, forgave her attacker, asked God to forgive him and died holding a crucifix and a medal of Our Lady. She later appeared to her attacker in a vision while he was in prison. This led to his conversion

and he later testified at her cause for beatification.



9TH JULY ST AUGUSTINE ZHAO RONG AND COMPANIONS, MARTYRS 87 Chinese Catholics and 33 Western missionaries from the mid-17th century to 1930, were martyred because of their ministry, and, in some cases for their refusal to apostatise. Many died in the oxer Rebellion, in which anti-colonial peasant rebels slaughtered 30,000 Chinese converts to Christianity along with missionaries and other foreigners. They are

remembered with an optional memorial on this day.



11TH JULY ST BENEDICT was born at Nursia in c.480, the brother of St Scholastica. Most of what is known of his life comes from St Gregory the Great's writings. He left his studies in Rome to become a hermit in the mountains near Subiaco, and after a while many followers joined him. It is believed that some monks tried to poison him, possibly out of jealousy or due to his strict discipline. He moved to Monte Cassino, where he completed his Rule; a written guide for

those living a monastic life, with a strong emphasis on obedience, moderation and community life. Although Benedict never became a priest or ever intended to found a religious order, his Rule became the fundamental monastic code in Europe into the early middle ages.



13TH JULY ST HENRY (972-1024) As German king and Holy Roman Emperor, Henry was a practical man of affairs. He was energetic in consolidating his rule. He crushed rebellions and feuds. On all sides he had to deal with drawn-out disputes so as to protect his frontiers. This involved him in a number of battles, especially in the south in Italy; he also helped Pope Benedict VIII quell disturbances in Rome. Always his ultimate purpose was to establish

a stable peace in Europe. According to eleventh-century custom, Henry took advantage of his position and appointed as bishops men loyal to him. In his case, however, he avoided the pitfalls of this practice and actually fostered the reform of ecclesiastical and monastic life. He was canonized in 1146.



18TH JULY ST CAMILLUS DE LELUS was born at Bocchianico, Italy. He fought for the Venetians against the Turks, was addicted to gambling. He became a Capuchin novice, but was unable to be professed because of a diseased leg he contracted while fighting the Turks. He devoted himself to caring for the sick, and became director of St. Giacomo Hospital in Rome. He received permission from his confessor (St. Philip Neri) to be

ordained and decided, with two companions, to found his own congregation, the Ministers of the Sick (the Camellians), dedicated to the care of the sick. They ministered to the sick of Holy Ghost Hospital in Rome, enlarged their facilities in 1585, founded a new house in Naples in 1588, and attended the plague-stricken aboard ships in Rome's harbour and in Rome. In 1591, the Congregation was made into an order to serve the sick by Pope Gregory XIV, and in 1591 and 1605, Camillus sent members of his order to minister to wounded troops in Hungary and Croatia, the first field medical unit. Gravely ill for many years, he resigned as superior of the Order in 1607 and died in Rome on July 14. He was canonised in 1746, was declared patron of the sick, with St. John of God, by Pope Leo XIII, and patron of nurses and nursing groups by Pope Pius XI.



15TH JULY ST BONAVENTURE joined the order of Franciscans in 1243, and was soon recognised for his intellectual talents. He was sent to study in Paris where he taught and preached for many years. He was a contemporary of St Thomas Aquinas, with whom he defended the mendicant friars against their opponents. In 1257, Bonaventure was elected as the head of the Franciscans, and has since been considered the greatest friar minor since St Francis of

Assisi himself. He wrote important works on theology, philosophy and mysticism, and was declared a doctor of the church in 1588. He was also regarded for his compassionate and gentle nature and for his accessibility to those who sought him



16TH JULY OUR LADY OF MOUNT CARMEL Sacred Scripture celebrated the beauty of Carmel where the prophet Elijah defended the purity of Israel's faith in the living God. In the twelfth century, hermits withdrew to that mountain and later founded the Carmelite order devoted to the contemplative life under the patronage of Mary, the holy Mother of God. Devotion to Our Lady of Mount Carmel is worldwide, and most Catholics are familiar with the Scapular of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, also known as the Brown Scapular. Mary appeared to St. Simon

Stock on July 16, 1251, and gave him the scapular with the following words, which are preserved in a fourteenth century narrative: 'This will be for you and for all Carmelites the privilege, that he who dies in this will not suffer eternal fire.' The feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel was

instituted for the Carmelites in 1332, and extended to the whole Church by Benedict XIII in 1726.

20TH JULY ST APOLLINARIS was believed to be born in Antioch, in the Roman province of Syria. Tradition has it that he was the first bishop of Ravenna and was appointed by St Peter himself, after which, he faced constant persecution by Roman authorities. He was eventually arrested, tortured and put to death by the sword, although there is no reliable written information about his life and martyrdom. Apollinaris is a patron saint against epilepsy and gout.



22ND JULY ST MARY MAGDALENE St Mary of Magdala was a disciple of Christ who was healed by him when he cast out seven devils. She stood at the foot of the cross as Jesus died, and went to the tomb to anoint his body on the morning of Easter Sunday. She was the first witness to Jesus' resurrection when she found his tomb empty. In St Mark's Gospel, it is Mary Magdalene to whom the risen Jesus first appears and further to this, in St John's account, Jesus gives

her a message to pass on to his brethren. Since the time of Pope Gregory the Great, a tradition in the Western church arose that identified Mary Magdalene as the unnamed sinner who anointed Christ's feet, and Mary of Bethany, the sister of Martha and Lazarus. But since 1969 the new Roman calendar has rejected this belief entirely.



23RD JULY ST BRIDGET, RELIGIOUS. Patron saint of Sweden, Bridget married a young prince and lived happily with him for 28 years, bearing him eight children. St. Catherine of Sweden was their daughter. After her husband died, Bridget founded the Order of the Most Holy Saviour, erecting at Vadstena a double monastery for monks and nuns. Following the guidance of the Holy Spirit, she later went to Rome, where she worked for the return of the Popes from

Avignon. This Scandinavian mystic is famous for her Revelations concerning the sufferings of our Redeemer.



25TH JULY ST JAMES, APOSTLE James, with Peter and John are a group of three privileged disciples whom Jesus admitted to important moments in his life. Present for the Transfiguration event (Mk 9:2-8) they attend our Lord during his agony in the garden of Gethsemane. (Mk 14:32-42). We know nothing of St. James's early life. He was the brother of John, the beloved disciple, and the Synoptic Gospels tell us only that James and John were with their father by the Sea of Galilee

when Jesus called them to follow him. The only apostle whose martyrdom is recorded in the New Testament, James is traditionally believed to be the first of the twelve apostles martyred for his faith. Pope Benedict in reflecting on the apostles observed that James' journey from the mount of the Transfiguration to the mount of Agony symbolises the entire pilgrimage of Christian life. In following Jesus, like St James he says, we know that even in difficulties we are on the right path.



26TH JULY STS JOACHIM AND ANNE, Parents of the Blessed Virgin Mary Joachim was the husband of Saint Anne and the father of Mary the mother of Jesus, The story of Joachim and Anne first appears in the apocryphal Gospel of James. Joachim and Anne are not mentioned in the Bible.

According to tradition, Saint Anne was born in Bethlehem, and married Joachim of Nazareth, both descendants of David. Tradition has it that the parents of the Blessed Virgin, who, apparently, first lived in Galilee, came later on to settle in Jerusalem. However, as his wife was barren, the high priest rejected Joachim and his sacrifice, as his wife's childlessness was interpreted as a sign of divine displeasure. Joachim consequently withdrew to the desert where he fasted and

did penance for forty days. Angels then appeared to both Joachim and Anne to promise them a child. Joachim later returned to Jerusalem and embraced Anne at the city gate. There was ancient belief that a child born of an elderly mother who had given up hope of having offspring was destined for great things. Parallels occur in the Old Testament in the case of Hannah, mother of Samuel.



29TH JULY ST MARTHA. Jesus loved Martha, Mary and Lazarus. In St John's Gospel it tells of the special relationship Jesus had with the. Jesus was a frequent visitor to their home. We read of three visits in Luke 10:38-42, John 11:1-53 and John 12:1-9. Luke tells how Martha welcomes Jesus and his disciples into her home and immediately goes to work to serve them; whilst Mary sits and listens to Jesus. Jesus observes that Martha is worried about

many things that distract her from really being present to him and he reminds her that there is only one this that is truly important, listening to him. The next visit shows how well Martha learned his lesson. She is grieving the death of her brother. When she hears Jesus is in the area she goes to meet him. In her conversation with Jesus she shows her faith and courage stating clearly without doubt that she believes in Jesus' power, in the resurrection and most of all that Jesus is the Son of God. Jesus tells her he is the resurrection and the life and then goes on to raise her brother from the dead. Finally, Jesus returns to share a meal with his good friends and all we hear about Martha is simply that she "served". She isn't in the spotlight, she simply serves Jesus.



30TH JULY ST PETER CHRYSOLOGUS About 431, Peter, a deacon, became bishop of Ravenna, Italy. Many Christians in his diocese were following false teachings and living by values that were not Christian. Peter became known as an outstanding preacher. He also preached to catechumens preparing for Baptism. At the bishops' meeting in Constantinople in 448,

Eutyches, a false teacher, denied that Jesus was both God and man. When the bishops refused Eutyches the right to teach his false ideas, he went to Peter for help. But Peter said, "In the interest of peace and the faith we cannot judge in matters of faith without the consent of the Roman bishop [the pope]." Peter Chrysologus believed that Christians should acquire knowledge to support the Christian faith. He encouraged education as a God-given opportunity and obligation. About 450, Peter died where he had been born: Imola, Italy. Thirteen centuries later, Pope Benedict XIII declared him a Doctor of the Church because of his homilies.



31st July St Ignatius of Loyola, PRIEST (ca. October 27, 1491 – July 31, 1556) was a Spanish knight from a local Basque noble family, hernit, priest since 1537, and theologian, who founded the Society of Jesus (Jesuits) and, on 19 April 1541, became its first Superior General. Loyola's devotion to the Catholic Church was characterized by absolute obedience to the Pope. After being seriously wounded in the Battle of Pamplona in 1521, he underwent a spiritual

conversion while in recovery. After claiming to experience a vision of the Virgin Mary and the infant Jesus at the shrine of Our Lady of Montserrat in March 1522, he went to Manresa, where he began praying for seven hours a day, often in a nearby cave, and formulating the fundamentals of the *Spiritual Exercises*. Ignatius and a few followers bound themselves by vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience. In 1539, they formed the Society of Jesus, approved in 1540 by Pope Paul III, as well as his *Spiritual Exercises* approved in 1548. Loyola also composed the *Constitutions* of the Society. He died in July 1556, was beatified by Pope Paul V in 1609, canonized by Pope Gregory XV in 1622, and declared patron of all spiritual retreats by Pope Pius XI in 1922. Ignatius is a foremost patron saint of soldiers, the Society of Jesus, the Basque Country, and the provinces of Gipuzkoa and Biscay.



How do I become an SRE volunteer? Special Religious Education (SRE) teachers are authorised who arè volunteers commissioned by the parish priest to go into the classroom to teach religious education using an approved curriculum. Successful SRE volunteers have a love for children and communicate well with them. They are comfortable with being on a faith journey with the children and are willing to learn more about themselves and their faith. They will commit to attend classes punctually and regularly. Volunteers are required by law to have a Working with Child clearance and declare they Children Check clearance and declare they have not committed offenses against children. There is regular child protection training including adherence to the Diocesan Code of Conduct. SRE is a great opportunity for university students and others. The Working With Children Check has been operating in NSW for nearly five years and some Working With Children (WWC) numbers expired from 15 June 2018.
