Homily - 5th Sunday of Lent.....by Fr Paul

My dear sisters and brothers,

In the midst of the Corona Virus Pandemic we turn to the word of God for comfort and healing. This Sunday's Gospel contains the story of Jesus raising his friend Lazarus from the dead. Jesus says to his sisters Martha and Mary "I am the Resurrection and the Life, do you believe this?" We believe our God gives us the gift of life and not even death can take away that gift.

This present health crisis is confronting the human family with how much we do value the gift of life. The efforts of our Government to protect our population from the spread of the virus calls us all to reflect on how we can care for one another.

We know that our parish communities are deeply saddened that for the time being we cannot gather to celebrate the Mass in our parish churches. Weddings can now only be held with the celebrant, the couple and two witnesses and in most of our parishes couples are choosing to postpone their wedding till after this crisis passes. Funerals can only be held with up to 10 people and we are required to respect the social distancing at those gatherings. This is a very painful time for families who experience the death of a loved one.

So let's continue to carry each other in prayer. Each week our parish office will send out a copy of our Sunday readings, a homily and prayers. I encourage you to reflect on the word of God and to pray in your homes.

We are very gifted in the 21st century by our technology that enables us to stay in touch with each other through phones and computers. It is important that we continue to bring life to each other through conversations on the phone and through emails and other social means of communication.

May these days of crisis lead us to a renewed trust in our God, a renewed seeking the guidance of the Holy Spirit in how best to care for each other and a renewed trust that God gives us the gift of life here on earth and for ever in heaven.






Welcome Fr Michael Kelly SJ

Michael Kelly was born in Sydney in 1953. I went to the parish primary school in North Sydney till I went to St Aloysius College where our bishop Bill Wright and I were classmates.

When Bill went to Springwood I went to the Jesuit Novitiate (1971) and Bill was ordained in, from memory 1978, well ahead of my ordination in 1984.

Since ordination, I have worked in media one way or another - writing, reporting, editing, publishing and marketing. For the last almost 12 years I've been based in Bangkok, mostly managing the Asia wide news and information service of the Church across Asia called UCAN-www.ucanews.com.



In the last five years, I've also developed two publications in partnership with European Catholic publishers: La Croix International at www.international.la-Croix.com which has quickly become the premier independent online Catholic daily in the world; and La Civilta Cattolica at www.laciviltacattolica.com which is the most outstanding thing the Jesuits do in long form journalism in the world.

Almost by accident, I have stumbled into assisting with the resettlement of 500 families of persecuted Christians trapped in Bangkok. This is the most time and energy consuming thing I do because the need is urgent and immediate and often extreme. But we have some success with resettlement though it takes patience and perseverance.

I look forward to serving the people of the diocese and sharing what I've learnt along the way about God's saving goodness.

Message from Fr Paul regarding First & Second Collections

Dear Parishioners

I am very aware that the corona virus health crisis will have financial repercussions for many people, many are loosing their jobs and needing to seek government support. In this climate I feel reluctant to talk to parishioners about financial matters. However, here are some of my reflections on the present financial situation for our parishes.

Thank you to those who have made donations to our parishes since our Masses were discontinued last weekend. Thank you for your thoughtfulness and generosity.

We are getting a number of enquires at the parish office about how our parishioners may continue to support our parishes financially during this health crisis. As you know each Sunday at Mass we have two collections the first collection goes to the Maitland Clergy central fund which supports the priests of our diocese and the second collection covers the running expenses of each of our parishes.

As we are not holding public Masses I am still thinking about how best to respond to parishioners who want to make donations to either the first and second collections. At present a number of our parishioners contribute to the second collection through direct debit so I am still in discussions with Louise our Parish manager on how we might offer ways to our parishioners to continue to support the parishes financially. So when we have some further ideas about this we will let you know.




FRIDAY OF THE LORD'S PASSION (GOOD FRIDAY) Today the Church is empty, it is stripped. We acknowledge that Jesus is going through His passion. The Sacraments are not celebrated today as we are in mourning. We wait as Jesus hangs upon the Cross. We venerate the wood of that Cross, and we pause as our Saviour dies for our Redemption. By ancient tradition we receive communion from those Hosts which where consecrated on Holy Thursday night.

HOLY SATURDAY We are in mourning for Jesus who is in the Tomb. We await with joyful hope the experience of His Resurrection.

At the Vigil, this "Vigil of all Vigils" we mark with Joy the wondrous gift to us that is our Redemption. We celebrate with exuberant joy and wonder this event in history. We hear from the Bible God promising His people their redemption and we hear from the Gospel the account of the finding of the Empty Tomb! The fire is Blessed and the Paschal Candle is lit, the water of Baptism is blessed and those who are to be received into full Communion with us are brought into the Church of God. We renew our Baptismal promises, and begin again the new life of the risen Lord.





May the Resurrection of our Saviour be a constant reminder of His love and promise of eternal life.

Saints and Feasts in April 2020



2/4/2020 ST FRANCIS OF PAOLA (HERMIT) At the age of thirteen, Francis of Paola lived in a Franciscan friary and a year later, went on a pilgrimage to Rome and Assisi. He returned home and lived as a hermit in a cave by the sea. Eventually Francis was joined by others and a chapel was built at the cave site. He built his new community around his one word motto; charity. He became famous for his prophecies and was said to be a miracle worker. In 1482

the Pope sent him to France, at the special request of King Louis XI who was dying and sought a cure. He spent his remaining 25 years in France helping to bring peace between France and Spain.

4/4/2020 ST ISIDORE OF SEVILLE (BISHOP, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH) born in Spain in C. 560 AD to parents of high social rank. His elder brother, St Leander, served as Archbishop and was one of a body of learned men who taught Isidore at the Cathedral school of Seville. Following his brother's death in C. 600 AD, Isidore succeeded as Archbishop of Seville. During his 32 years of service, he worked



to assimilate the remaining Roman culture with the ruling barbarian culture of the Visigoths through education – introducing his countrymen to the Greek philosopher Aristotle. Regarded as one of the most learned men of his age, Isidore was the first Christian writer to attempt to compile an encyclopaedia of universal knowledge. In 1997, he was nominated to be the patron saint of the internet by Pope John Paul II.



5/4/2020 ST VINCENT FERRER (PRIEST) 1350-1419. was a Dominican friar who was born in Spain and entered the Dominican order in 1367, and quickly distinguished himself as a philosopher and preacher. He was a prolific and very successful preacher throughout Europe; he was able to end the schism in the Church which had begun in 1409, when there were three claimants to the See of Peter. Worn out by his labours he died in France on the 5th of April 1419. A spontaneous and

popular cult sprang up around him almost immediately. He was canonised in 1458.



7/4/2020 ST JOHN BAPTIST DE LA SALE (PRIEST) was born of a noble family in 1651 and from a young age was destined for the church. He was ordained a priest in 1678 and with the help of a layman he opened two schools for poor boys and dedicated the remainder of his life to education. Some of his initiatives included the establishment of the first training college for teachers and the division of classrooms into separate grades. Through

his work he founded the Order of the Brothers of the Christian Schools; today there are approximately 20,000 members of the 'Christian Brothers'. Because of John Baptist de la Salle's pioneering efforts, he was declared the patron saint of all school teachers.

11/4/2020 ST STANISLAUS (BISHOP, MARTYR) born of a noble Polish family in 1010. He became a priest and was eventually consecrated bishop of Cracow in 1072. Generous to the poor he was considered a zealous reformer. However, he fell foul of King Boleslaus II who was known as an unjust and violent sovereign. Stanislaus excommunicated the king for his refusal to repent for his wrong doings.



The king was enraged and had the bishop apprehended in the middle of a church service and according to tradition, the king despatched Stanislaus himself with his own sword. St Stanislaus is a patron of Poland.

13/4/2020 ST MARTIN I, POPE AND MARTYR. Little is known of the early life of the seventh century pope and martyr. He was elected pope in 649, and immediately found himself in the centre of a religious and political controversy. In the Byzantine (Eastern) Empire there was a heresy known as Monothelitism, which said that Christ, while on earth, had no human will.



but only a divine one. (The Church teaches that Jesus has two wills: a full and perfect divine one, and a full and perfect human one.) Several of the Eastern emperors had favoured Monothelitism, supported by the patriarch, or bishop, of the imperial city of Constantinople. Soon after his election, Pope Martin convened a Church council in Rome which officially rejected this teaching and condemned the efforts of the patriarch and emperor to promote it. An angered emperor tried to discredit and later to assassinate the pope. Failing in these efforts, the emperor sent troops to Rome with orders to arrest Martin. Already in poor health, Martin made no resistance, and in the imperial city he suffered torture and imprisonment. He later wrote, "For forty-seven days I have not been given water to wash in. I am frozen through and wasting away with dysentery. The food I get makes me ill. But God sees all things and I trust in Him." Pope Martin was exiled to Crimea, where he died in 655. St. Martin I is honoured as a martyr because of his death in exile; he was the last pope to suffer martyrdom.



29/4/2020 ST CATHERINE of SIENA (Virgin and doctor of the church) born youngest of 25 children of a wealthy Italian family in c1347. From a young age she devoted her life to prayer and became a tertiary sister of the Dominican order despite her parents objections. She worked with the sick and attracted a following of men and women who accompanied her on her frequent journeys. Catherine became heavily

involved in the politics of both Church and State as she attempted to make peace between Florence and the papacy. She urged Pope Gregory to return the papacy to Rome from Avignon, which he did in 1376. His death two years later led to a schism in the Western church, as detractors of the newly elected pope Urban VI set up a rival pope in Avignon. In an effort to restore unity to the church, Catherine gave support to the Urban VI but was exhausted by her efforts. She died soon after suffering a stroke, aged only 33.



30/4/2020 ST PIUS V; POPE, OPTIONAL MEMORIAL 1504-1572. a Dominican Friar and bishop, was one of the most important popes of the counterreformation era. Elected pope in 1565 he made it quite clear his intention to implement the degree of the Council of Trent in both letter and spirit. He was immediately loved by the Roman people for his holiness and for his radical reform


of the morals of the city as well as for a drastic and dramatic purge of the Roman Curia. For the needs of the Church he made important decisions. Bishops were to reside in their dioceses, religious orders were to be reformed the Breviary and the Roman Missal updated and made obligatory except where there was a prescription of 200 years in favour of local rites. The Roman Catechism was completed and translated into many languages, and catechetical instruction of the young made obligatory for all parish priests. Well loved for his prayer life and his commitment to monastic austerity, personal devotion, and kindness to the poor and sick. He was canonised in 1712.

The History of the Catholic Church in the Maitland Area Part 10 - The Churches in our Region

St Joseph's East Maitland Parish, established 1835 - St Joseph's Church, East Maitland is located on the site

of the first church built north of Sydney and records indicate some type of wooden structure on this site as early as 1829. The foundation stone of the old St Joseph's Church was laid on 12th August 1834 by Fr Therry. From this church the foundations of the Catholic Church in the Hunter Valley began. The first resident bishop of the Maitland Diocese, Bishop Murray, said his first Mass in St Joseph's Church and it was from St Joseph's Presbytery that Bishop Murray administered the fledgling Maitland Diocese for five years before he moved to Victoria Street, Maitland in 1871.





East Maitland parishioners with Fr. Morrissey at the closing of the old St Joseph's Church, 13th August 1933


In 1933 St Joseph's church was the oldest Catholic Church still use in in Australia. In that year it was proposed that the church old be demolished and replaced by "a grand brick structure to cope

with the increasing population". Donations to support the building of the new church were sought from past and present parishioners.

On 13th August 1933, the last Mass was celebrated in the century old church. As quoted in the Newcastle & Maitland Catholic Sentinel 1st August 1933, "The passing of St Joseph's will close an interesting chapter in the history of the Catholic Church in the Hunter Valley."





On 19th November 1933 parishioners gathered to witness Maitland's Bishop Edmund Gleeson lay the foundation stone of the new church. They stood on the spot where, more than a hundred years earlier Fr Therry had laid the foundation stone of the original church. The opening ceremony of the new St Joseph's Church was held on Sunday 22nd April 1934.

A feature of the new church is the rose window behind the altar. This window is a link with the old church as the stained glass of St Joseph and the glass around it came from the first church. Also from the old church are the Stations of the Cross fitted with new surrounds. Another link with the past is housed in the western turret of St Joseph's. The church bell once hung in a wooden belfry alongside the old church. It now hangs above the marble plaques commemorating the former parish priests of East Maitland and continues to summon all to prayer.


