The parish continues to follow relevant health advice. The following information is provided so that parishioners and visitors may know what to expect while attending Mass.

- $\label{eq:NSW} \checkmark \text{NSW Health still recommends } \textbf{physical distancing}.$
- √ Hand sanitiser is recommended and provided.
- √The wearing of a face mask can help protect you and those around you. Masks are available at the church entrance.
- ✓ Pick up your **bulletin** and take it home with you afterwards. We are no longer re-use bulletins.
- √ Holy Water is available and changed regularly.
- ✓ Select your **seat** and allow space between families / households.
- √Singing is permissible.
- ✓ Parishes can now use liturgical ministers readers, servers, etc.
- ✓ Procession of Gifts may take place as directed by our Priest.
- √The Sign of Peace remains contactless except between those residing in the same household.
- √The distribution of Communion during Mass continues to present a risk. Please <u>maintain a single line</u>. In general, two (2) ministers (including the Priest) are adequate to distribute the Lord's Body.
- The **Communion host** can be received in the hand, and on the tongue with care. Since the latter is deemed high risk, <u>please</u> <u>proceed to the Priest only and at the end of the line</u>.
- The **Precious Blood** is restricted to Priests only.
- √The collection plate has resumed during Mass. Thank you for your continued support.
 - First Collection supports all our Diocesan Priests.
- Second Collection supports our parish operating costs.
- ✓ Exit whilst maintaining physical distancing.

Reflection

We've all had to put up with boring speeches or sermons from time to time, whether it be from politicians, preachers, at school speech nights or the local service or sports club. Every now and then though we come across someone who really arrests our attention. It mightn't be only that he or she puts words together well; it's often a combination of that



and something in the content that strikes a chord. Maybe we are even envious of the obvious gift that person has. This is surely how Jesus came across to those people in the synagogue. This was someone quite different; they had had their share of the run-of-the-mill scribes with their tired old platitudes. Here was someone who really meant what he said and was able to back it up with fearless engagement with a power from which they shrank in ignorance and doubt.

It is not without importance that this is the first public appearance of Jesus in the Gospel of Mark. Over the next few weeks we will witness the popular acceptance of Jesus as he battles with a force that takes various forms — physical sickness, opposition from entrenched mindsets, the accusation of collusion with the enemy itself. This is the 'gospel', the good news that Jesus invites the people to accept readily by changing their lives.

The same 'gospel' is offered to us for we are dealing with a power that can change our lives, not merely a set of nice, pious sayings. Too often we reduce the gospels to that and so remain relatively unmoved by the dynamic challenge they contain.

As we know, in that society possession by 'unclean spirits' was a general term that covered all kinds of conditions for which we today have medical or social explanations and sophisticated labels. We can therefore approach these stories with a type of superiority as if they either don't occur anymore or are best left to experts to deal with. Yet isn't it true that all of us are 'possessed' in different ways by forces over which we have to admit to having little or no control? Some people are enslaved by addictions to drugs, alcohol, food, gambling and so on. Many of us suffer from more subtle addictions so that we don't even want to admit to ourselves, let alone to anyone else, that we are virtually powerless to control them. All of us know deep down that many of our habits and ways of dealing with others are so much a part of our make-up that we can do little to change them.

The people who acclaimed Jesus realised that he had something special that could influence them to change their lives. The authority and healing power of Jesus is present today in his body, the Church, through the Sacraments, but also in the love, care and compassion of every community of faith. We only have to look around us when we are gathered for the Eucharist to name it and accept it. It is when the Church is able to back up teaching and doctrine with the same concern for the troubled lives of ordinary people that it is most effective in continuing the mission of Jesus. That is why in the Gospels he is always accompanied by followers learning how to be genuine 'fishers of men'.

Social Justice Committee Update

The Parish's Social Justice Committee (SJC), on your behalf and with your donations, supports The Mother and Baby Home (Baan Sukruthai) in Bangkok, Thailand. The home is run by the Good Shepherd Sisters. It offers a temporary refuge for women from all parts of Thailand who are expectant mothers, or have recently given birth, but have no support systems in place or come from disadvantaged backgrounds. This project supports these women as they participate in a program tailored to helping them overcome their personal experiences and develop a new, positive outlook on life.

All people staying at the home receive three (3) nutritious meals a day. They are also provided with other supplies they may need including milk powder for children, toys, nappies, burp cloths, bed sheets, cleaning supplies, shampoo, soap, and other household supplies. The sisters have ordered additional delivery beds to ensure mothers-to-be are comfortable.

Your support has also helped to ensure the home can cover basic running costs such as electricity and water bills, petrol for cars for the sisters to attend home visits, as well as staff salaries and basic maintenance. Recently a water pipe broke and was quickly repaired thanks to the funds available from your donation. Additionally, the bathrooms have had repairs for those who stay at the centre.

The sisters have conducted regular check ins with mothers who have left the home to see how their lives are going and if they need any additional support. Those who have chosen to leave are provided with transport to wherever they need it. The home provides a variety of services to those who need them including mental health consultations, transport to hospitals and assistance with hospital fees, and day and/or night visits as needed. Mothers who came to the home seeking emergency support were also provided with the care they needed.

Up to 7 January 2024 we have forwarded \$9,525 (from a promised \$10,000) to the home to meet its needs. The Parish Social Justice Committee will continue to support it until 30 June 2024 when a new international project, in conjunction with Catholic Mission, will be announced.

unmarried woman, like a young girl, can devote herself to the Lord's affairs; all she need worry about is being holy in body and spirit. The married woman, on the other hand, has to worry about the world's affairs and devote herself to pleasing her husband. I say this only to help you, not to put a halter round your necks, but simply to make sure that everything is as it should be, and that you give your undivided attention to the Lord.

In their synagogue just then there was a man possessed by an unclean spirit, and it shouted, 'What do you want with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are: the Holy One of God.' But Jesus said sharply, 'Be quiet! Come out of him!' And the unclean spirit threw the man into convulsions and with a loud cry went out of him. The people were so astonished that they started asking each other what it all meant. 'Here is a teaching that is new' they said 'and with authority behind

it: he gives orders even to unclean spirits and they obey him.' And his reputation rapidly spread everywhere, through all the surrounding Galilean countryside.
